#### COMMUNITY SERVICE LEARNING



- Calling attention of current and future practitioners to the health needs of underserved areas.
- Development of connections between the different health system partners, in particular with underserved communities.
- Exposure of community members, including youth, to positive examples of health professionals.
- Development of leadership and management skills among students.
- Countering the phenomenon of "vanquishing virtue" (that is, the tendency for students to become less altruistic as a function of professional socialization) [4,5].



#### LESSONS LEARNED-Spring 2018 Pilot

Faculty needs to be a resource to the team and not take over.

 Difficult to find a patient to participate in this program, important to find clinical and/or community support to provide a referral.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

Grow partnership with Maricopa Integrative Health Services (MIHS)

Set up an electronic referral system through the ED (establish if person meets criteria, consent to program, etc.)

- ED Pilot (Fall 2019 semester)
- SHOW students
- Biweekly or monthly meetings to learn from process
- Expand to other locations in the future (possibly Westward Ho, Maryvale, etc.).
- Data collection/Publishing cost impact and outcomes, population reached, etc.


